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## Do we really Need Passive Fire Protection?

### Passive Group Update

When conducting training on Passive Fire Protection I am often asked is Passive Fire Protection really necessary and is it ever needed? As an industry we have information provided to us about fires and associated fire saves, however the public is often unaware of the amount of fires that actually occur on a weekly basis.

Too often I have heard about fires that start from a commercial premises that unfortunately spread fire and smoke to other fire cells (in a few situations to accommodation above) due to no or incorrect fire stopping or lack of dampers. While no one was hurt in the fires on these occasions, property damage was an issue and smoke damage was significant. One client who engaged me to ensure the fire cell of his new tenant (Chinese Restaurant) was truly a fire cell had good reason.

In another building he owned there were three tenants with one of them being a restaurant. The restaurant had a fire and mainly smoke penetrated into the other fire cells due to very poor or no fire stopping of service penetrations through fire walls and floors. The smoke damage to both of the other tenants was significant and financial loss to the building owner was enough to make sure this will not happen again.

Too often when undertaking construction monitoring of Passive Fire Protection many people are too casual about what they are installing and don't appreciate that they are installing a fire safety system. While the above example did not include a loss of life other examples have had close calls and I certainly hope it does not take a loss of life to force significant change.

## Passive Tip

When installing fire stopping systems **read the literature and learn how the system was tested.**

The literature may state that sealant is to be installed around the pipe before a collar is installed to reduce the spread of smoke, or when using sealant it may state that the sealant is to be installed in between the cables.

Smoke can spread through poorly installed fire stopping systems like in the photo below which had a real fire on the other side of the plasterboard wall. While this may seem insignificant to some, with many penetrations like this, they will allow considerable amount of smoke through to another fire cell. If this is a rest home or hospital then it is even more critical.

## Evacuation Consultants Group Update

**I hope my writing finds you all well.**

I feel compelled to share a scenario and in doing so challenge the expressed opinion by some in the industry that Evacuation Consultants entirety of role entails to ensure everybody is out during practice runs, commonly known as trial evacuation drills.

This example in my observation is not an isolated incident and perhaps more common than we may wish to admit. It will assist in taking a look at the importance of understanding fire protection systems as an integral part in 'directing' the evacuation procedure.

The care facility houses occupants, dependent on staff assistance in the event of a fire outbreak. Residence will need help to evacuate to the next safe fire cell and/or via the nearest safe exit to a pace of safety.

In this very well equipped and managed age care facility, two sprinkler heads located in a bedroom and adjacent to a final exit door required maintenance work. This resulted in the sprinkler head being 'clamped' in early 2016. Late May that year at the time of six monthly trial evacuation the clamps were still in place, long after the maintenance work had been completed.



People due to installed fire protection systems, existing fire evacuation and organisational procedures report to experience a sense of security. Additionally the expectations, that all together, and in its parts, everything works, fosters reliance and enables occupants to go about their daily life with reassurance. This in turn translates into greater confidence aiding safe evacuation in the event of an outbreak of fire.

**So what happens when one 'small' change could change everything?**

As Fire Evacuation Consultants do we consider it 'good practice' and are responsible to understand and advice the age care owner and/or manager accordingly to: the change-affect on the means of escapes and egress route? The need for an interim revised evacuation procedure, a risk management strategy and liaison with the maintenance agency?

Consider, as in this example, the existence of good fire protection systems, well thought through evacuation-strategies, and well-trained staff. The assumption of being well equipped to manage an emergency requiring evacuation is based on and in accordance to, that all active and passive fire protection system pertaining to the building are maintained and able to operate as to design to keep occupants safe.

This simple little clamp and the fact that it is attached to a sprinkler head in a fully occupied care facility, mostly unnoticed, will not disturb the occupant's sense of security. However noticed or not it impacts on the way how staff and residence would need to go about evacuation and manage that area of the building in the event of a fire is of considerable importance.

Is it reasonable to take the position that we are not IQP's nor are technicians and therefore leave it to those experts, deciding to make no mention of the change-effect of this little orange device to the owner and/or manger on discovering its existence?

How and if so, does duty of care and due diligence under the new Health and Safety in Work Act 2016, a reality for consultants working in this type of buildings with level 3 and 4, apply?

Luckily no fire outbreak occurred during that time of considered increased risk and the clamp was removed by the contracted agency on prompting of the care facility owner shortly afterwards.

I trust the next two scheduled technical sessions for 15th of June 2016 and 17th of August 2016 will be a treat and stimulate rich discussions. The presenters are: Todd O' Donoghue's speaking on "Evacuation gone right and evacuation gone wrong". He will be sharing his rich repertoire of NZ Fire Service experience in the June session. Nicky Vaugham will present in the August meeting on "Mitigation when selecting assembly areas" from her wealth of knowledge from a health & safety perspective.

I take this opportunity to thank both presenters on behalf of the SIG Group for offering to share their knowledge and in doing so enrich us all.

## HOW SAFE IS SAFE?

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## Creative Installations

We see many interesting installations of product being used outside of the application for what they were designed. While it may seem a good idea at the time, and solve a problem, there may be unintended negative consequences. In some cases it will only be when there is system failure or system activation that the application will be shown as deficient. Supervisors need to be careful that product they are sourcing is suitable for our industry and is being used for the intended purpose.



**Over size twist clip.** This clip is one size bigger than the pipe. As a result the clip is not tightly holding the pipe. This means the pipe is no longer restrained longitudinally and potentially may shift. Same also applies when pipe clips aren't the correct size.

**Wrong bolts.** Bolts are meant to extend beyond the nut by at least two threads. Using bolts that are too short risks the joint bursting. Rubber "doughnut" joints also need longitudinal restraint.



**Flexible dropper used as seismic joint.** There are two problems here. Firstly the losses though flexible droppers are significant; did the designer build those into their design? Secondly flexible dropper are only designed and tested for

a small amount of deflection under pressure; will the flexible dropper break during a seismic event – who knows? We also note that the right hand side of this assembly is not restrained.

**Strap bracing isn't a pipe hanger.**



**Flexible droppers are supplied with ceiling brackets for a reason.** Pipe clips and saddles don't grip the dropper properly, as a result the

sprinkler doesn't sit in the ceiling correctly. We don't know if the sprinkler will stay in place if it discharges.



## PTFE Tape Usage

While I was running around Auckland doing inspections I came across this in the valve room.

This was at a site that had just had a very recent upgrade to ESFH. My understanding is that the correct usage of PTFE Tape is to only wrap the tape around the threads 3-5 times for it to work correctly. Is this something we should be watching out for? The manufacturer instructions say to use "a small amount of tape" when installing .... Generally when this much tape has been used they are trying to stop leaks, I was under the impression that most leaks on these styles of heads are due to incorrect installation, over torquing, or not using the correct spanner and damaging the Head?



*All sprinkler manufacturers recommend a maximum torque that sprinklers can be tightened too. Overtightening a sprinkler can lead to leakage, or even catastrophic failure.*

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# Calling all Halon Fire Extinguisher Owners



FPANZ is promoting awareness around Halon fire extinguishers and wants to recover these from the commercial sector and from private owners.

Halon has fallen out of favour due to its environmental impact and long atmospheric life time. It is considered to be a potent greenhouse gas and contributes to ozone depletion. However, safety is the main issue as servicing of Halon extinguishers has not been available since 1998 when the production of Halon was banned under the Montreal Protocol.

Over the previous ten years, more than 60 tonne of Halon has been recovered by FPANZ members and this was sent for safe destruction. It is estimated that a further five to ten tonne is still in use. This needs to be recovered now as any unit still in use will be well over ten years old and will not have been serviced.

“Fire extinguishers, just like smoke detectors, need to be checked by a certified agent annually” says Blind

“We do have fears that Halon extinguishers, due to this lack of servicing, may fail to operate correctly in the event of a fire. We are prompting all members of the public to check their boats, cars, workshops, caravans and planes to see if they still have a yellow Halon extinguisher and to exchange this for a unit coloured red”.

“There will be a cost to change, however both the public and the environment will benefit as we can be sure new systems will operate correctly in event of a fire and the impact on the ozone layer will also be reduced” says Blind.

There are now many suitable and cleaner alternatives available and FPANZ members located nationwide will accept Halon units and provide information on the safer alternatives available. Halon extinguishers are easy to identify as they are bright yellow. Replacement units will be coloured red.

“We look forward to gathering as many of the remaining Halon systems and hand held fire extinguishers here in New Zealand and to have the contents safely destroyed” says Blind.

“We will also have greater confidence that owners will be protected in the event of a fire and this will ultimately protect lives”.

Our message is: **“Be Safe Yellow is Out – Red is In!”**

While there, talk to these experts about your needs and how best to protect against fire, including alternatives such as a red fire extinguisher\*, a fire blanket, a smoke alarm, and other effective choices. Often a combination is the best approach.

**So act now and hand in your old yellow extinguisher.** It's a service for the general public and small businesses. A small recovery charge will be set at \$10 per kilogram (up to a maximum extinguisher weight of 2.1 kg in size). A Halon extinguisher larger than 2.1kg is considered a commercial size and will be disposed of at a quoted rate.

*\*There is more than one type of red fire extinguisher on the market. Ask which one best suits your needs.*

## Graham's View

I've often said that the success of the Charter is down to the fact that it is industry-led; that as creators of risk, industries lead the charge in managing those risks.



But what we don't often acknowledge is the important role government plays in supporting safer and healthier workplaces. Right from the outset, the Charter has enjoyed support from a whole range of government agencies – all with the collective goal of rebuilding Canterbury safely.

Two of the Charter's biggest supporters have been WorkSafe and ACC. Both agencies have responsibility for workplace injury and harm prevention and the Charter has provided them with the opportunity to engage with local industry, to implement programmes and to drive improved H & S behaviours.

Worksafe and ACC are now partnering for injury and harm prevention right across New Zealand. The Reducing Harm in New Zealand Workplaces Action Plan will be released in July; it's a suite of cross-industry initiatives focused on areas of highest risk for fatalities, severe injuries and poor work-related health outcomes.

The Plan is very much a response to the Government's 2013 'Working Safer' blueprint, which identified problems in New Zealand's workplace H & S system, including a lack of collaboration and coordination between agencies on harm prevention. As industry representatives, I'm sure we've all had experience of this, but this Plan will enable us all to be clear on what is being delivered and why; what our role is in creating and maintaining safe workplaces and how these actions fit in with the wider workplace H & S landscape.

Finally we have a much-needed framework for targeted, evidence-based injury and harm prevention interventions that will have a measureable impact on health and safety outcomes in New Zealand workplaces.

As Charter members, we're used to seeing Worksafe and ACC working together. This Plan will work for the rest of New Zealand because the benefits of this partnership approach are already evident here in Canterbury.

The Charter has been revised in light of the Health and Safety at Work Act which came into effect in April this year.


While it has a similar look and feel, it has been updated to include some new Commitments such as Upstream and Downstream Duties while merging others such as PPE and Site Safety Risks.


## ACC Data Update

New construction-related claims in Canterbury decreased again in April – 538 claims lodged compared to 542 in March 2016. Those claims that become entitlement claims – that is where a person requires more than 5 days off work – also decreased (82 for April cf. 84 for March). The average cost of claims in the first 12 months post-injury was \$1948.


In March 2016, the average number of new construction claims registered with ACC over the last 12 months was 540, which is down by 1.8% when compared to the 12 months moving average number of new construction claims on February at 550.
