

# A message from our National President

Last year, my introduction to my message in our annual report opened with a statement outlining what an extraordinary year we had faced. Again, and with a heavy heart, I need to open with the same statement, noting though that in the 2020/2021 financial year, we did not actually endure a Level 4 Lockdown.

The yo-yo effect of the disruptions caused by the corona virus had impact on the association's operations, including the need to postpone a Get it Right Seminar the night before it commenced. However, the most significant impact was cancellation of the Fire New Zealand Conference, which was scheduled for October, and then tentatively rescheduled for March. While not impacting on this year's results, we also had to cancel the 2021 conference, which was scheduled for October 2021.

While the Fire New Zealand conference contributes to the Association's revenue stream, I am pleased to report that we returned a surplus once again. We have reduced costs by, for example, shutting our office and asking our team to work from home. We now have solid reserves that will allow us to review and expand our operations when the world begins to return to whatever the new normal is.

The Association and its members have continued to contribute to the development of fire protection standards, including:

- › NZS4512:2021 Fire Detection and Alarm Systems in Buildings
- › NZS4514:2021 Interconnected Smoke Alarms for Houses

We are also contributing to the rewrite of NZS4510:2008 Fire Hydrant Systems in Buildings. This document is likely to be published in the Association's 2021/2022 financial year.

Other projects that the association has been involved with are the development of two Codes of Practice:

- › Passive Fire Protection Coatings
- › Integrated Fire Safety Systems

We have maintained our close working relationships with The Ministry of Business Innovation and Business (Building Sector Performance Group, and Standards New Zealand), The Society of Fire Protection Engineers, and The Institution of Fire Engineers.

I would like to acknowledge and thank Rob Fenton for his service to the fire protection industry, and to the association's Board. Rob retired in June, and is hopefully enjoying fresh fish from his home in Northland.

I would like to personally thank Elaine and Scott for their work this past year. As the vaccination rates increase, I know they will continue working hard next year to move the Association forward to continue the evolution of our Association.

# A message from our Chief Executive Officer

## Welcome to this year's annual report

While it would be easy to fall into the trap of talking about the effects of COVID-19 in a negative way, I have chosen to focus on the positive things that we have been able to achieve for our association's membership in this financial year. The association has yet again produced another modest financial surplus for the past financial year while still delivering all business-as-usual functions for our members. This has been achieved with some active cost management, some expense reductions, some moves to a contract resource model, and increasing some revenue streams to make up for others that declined. We have also delivered some significant milestones for the industry, have grown our membership numbers, and are more agile and able to communicate with a wider more geographically and sector-diverse membership base that has continued to grow. So, there is much to be happy about despite the ongoing effects of the global pandemic that is COVID-19.

In this financial year, we achieved several significant milestones for our industry. Standards are obviously one of the key things, with the revision and publication of NZS 4512 *Fire Detection and Alarm Systems in Buildings* and NZS 4514 *Interconnected Smoke Alarms for Houses*. Along with these standards, substantial work has been carried out on FPANZ codes of practice and position statements. I liken all the work on these documents to the construction of the foundations in a building: they create the stable base for our industry to operate in, and they mandate and validate the work and products used in our industry. That's why, as an industry body, it is important for us to keep these documents current and to continue to develop more codes of practice and position statements. We are also tackling NZS 4510 *Fire Hydrant Systems for Buildings* and hope to have a project for NZS 4503 *Hand-Operated Fire-Fighting Equipment* in the 2022 calendar year.

In the past few years, we have very successfully grown the membership; however, this growth brings its own set of challenges. Our objectives have been to ensure the reputation of both our brand and our members. With this foremost in our minds, we introduced a new membership process that allows for additional steps and verification for any new applications, meaning that new members must hold a provisional status for 12 months.

One of the significant advantages FPANZ has over some industry organisations is its structure. While our governance board ensures the organisation works within its mandate, governance guidelines, and constitution, I refer to the council as the engine room of our organisation: it's representative of the members and the different sectors and it drives the overall direction of the association. I wish to take this opportunity to thank all members of the national council for their contributions over the past year. I would also like to give special mention to the following council members who have completed their elected terms: Kris Tocker, Jake Symes, Nicky Marshall, George McGoram, and board member Rob Fenton, who has recently retired from the board. At the time of publication, the election of new council and board members is underway. I would also like to point out that the special interest group (SIG) chairs do a great job of representing their respective industries and contribute significantly in terms of time and effort, so please be sure to support your respective chairs and join in where you can.



Disappointingly, we have now had to cancel FireNZ twice due to COVID-19 restrictions. However, on a positive note, FireNZ will be back in September 2022, and it will be held in Christchurch for the first time in over 12 years. Further details will be released soon, but we are already planning a big come-back conference that you won't want to miss.

To wrap up my report, thank you to our members; your continued support and needs are our driver and motivation to continue to promote, support, advocate, represent, and grow our industry.

I would also like to personally thank those who donate their time in the SIGs, the national council, and the board of directors. Together, we continue to evolve our association into a strong and reputable peak industry body. The association is in a very strong financial and resource position to execute a revised strategy as we start to enter a world that lives with COVID-19. We look forward to the new calendar year and the positive achievements we plan to deliver on behalf of the membership.

With the continued support from FPA Members IFE & SFPE, we see a bright future for the event in 2022 at the Te Pae Convention Centre, in Christchurch.


# SIGs

# Passive Fire Protection SIG Report

Sadly, the roaring success that the start of the year brought us came crashing back to reality in August this year, and we are all now heading into uncharted territory again. I commend all of our Auckland colleagues who have persevered with the long lockdown conditions and hope that 2022 will provide rewards for yourselves and your businesses.



As I reflect upon this year, it is hard to not blur 2020 and 2021 into one. It has been jam-packed, despite the impacts of Covid. In fact, on reflection the past two years and the previous three years in the Passive SIG have all been jam-packed and hugely productive for the industry. It is hard to remind ourselves that in 2016, none of the following tools were available to the Passive Fire Industry:

- 】 Passive Fire Products Register
- 】 Intumescent Coatings Code of Practice
- 】 NZQA Level 3 Passive Installers Qualification
- 】 Position Statement 1, 2 & 4
- 】 Passive Get it Right Seminars

All of the above wouldn't be achievable without the extremely proactive Passive SIG membership.

2021 has been highlighted by the following actions that are in play and nearing completion:

- 】 Passive Get it Right Seminar – Christchurch
  - More planned for Auckland, Wellington and Regions as soon as reliable dates can be firmed up
- 】 Fire and Smoke Stopping Code of Practice Working Group – ongoing
- 】 Passive Products Register Generation 2 – online filterable version
  - IT development
  - Working group reviews on usability
  - Manufacturer data population
  - Due for release upon return of Manufacturers data
- 】 Fire & Smoke Curtains Standard review – Working Group
- 】 Intumescent Coatings Code of Practice – Market review and feedback
  - Version 2.0 hoping to be updated prior to Christmas break
- 】 NZQA Level 4 Passive Fire Protection – Qualification periodical review
  - Working Group reviewing qualification as it was and new pathways moving forward
- 】 NZQA Level 3 Passive Fire Installers
  - >240 enrolled
  - >40 Graduated installers across NZ
- 】 Intumescent Coatings Unit standards – early research.
- 】 Wider industry outreach
  - Greater involvement from wider industry in initiatives including NZIA joining two working groups, MBIE, SFPE, BCA's, Insurance Council, Head Contractors
  - SFPE Webinar presentation to >100 attendees on FPANZ Passive SIG initiatives
- 】 Passive Fire Certified Contractor List
  - Business case research underway

In 2022 I would really like to focus a lot of my time for FPANZ on not only supporting members and industry participants, but also spreading our outreach to wider industry groups including electricians, plumbers, builders, and the like to spread the importance of Passive Fire Protection/Intumescent Coatings and how it can be done correctly with the right companies, tools and attitude. We will do this by providing quality impartial technical advice and support as we build upon the credibility of our industry and trade.

Thanks everyone for your support in 2021 and I look forward to more progress in 2022.

# Hand Operated Fire Fighting Equipment (HOFFE) SIG Report

Once again, our SIG group has had a very disrupted year due to the COVID pandemic making its presence felt. This is an ongoing problem for most and unfortunately the current Delta outbreak is still active, especially in Auckland where our group has a strong base. That said, the year has still had some positive outcomes for our group, these are as follows:

- › We have had some new members join our SIG group during this year and had the timely return of an important insurance company, this is particularly relevant as we are looking at reviewing NZS4503 at present.
- › We have had progress on our NZS4503 review. Whilst it's not moving as fast as some would like it is still progressing with some funding secured and agreement from the group on a funding model going forward.
- › Our position statement on the use of HOFFE has been now been modified to include the FPA's opposition to the removal of Hand Operated Fire-Fighting Equipment.
- › We have seen increased usage of the online attendance option for our SIG group meetings, especially the September meeting which due to COVID was online only.

**Summary:** overall we have still moved forward and we expect that this trend will continue, especially as our group gets more involved in important industry projects like the review of NZS4503.

# Evacuation Consultants SIG Report



In a year overshadowed by the impacts of COVID, it's timely to acknowledge some of the positive work continuing in the background and the ways we have adjusted to our new normal. Over the last 12 months, we have seen a significant shift towards stakeholders recognising the importance of evacuation considerations, not only from a building perspective, but also in how occupants can safely make their way to an assembly area. For example, Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) have begun asking more questions about what will happen to individuals once they leave the building, to ensure those requiring assistance (such as babies in evacuation cots) will have a suitable substrate to be manoeuvred along, prior to approving evacuation schemes.

We are also beginning to see more evacuation lifts proposed and incorporated into building design. This is creating some interesting conversations around the procedures that are required and how operators will interface with them in both staffed and non-staffed buildings. As processes like these are developed, it is becoming more important for building owners, engineers and evacuation consultants to communicate early in the design stage. It is exciting to see a gradually increasing recognition of the value evacuation consultants can bring to the table in this space.

Once again, the Covid-19 pandemic has impacted on our ability to run fire drills. Whilst there is no requirement from FENZ to run drills when there is a social distancing requirement in place, this does not remove the underlying need usually met by drills. Adapting to our new normal is seeing the evolution of staff refresher training via socially distanced mediums such as video conferencing, to ensure they remain familiar with their procedures and ready to act if needed.

Next year we expect to see a positive impact from the new staffing structure within FENZ, as appointees to the Advisor Risk Reduction and Advisor Community Readiness and Recovery roles settle into business as usual. With their support, it will be interesting to see what we can achieve. Perhaps we can hope to see greater awareness of fire risk reduction, such as maintaining clear escape routes and teams running their fire drills with better learning outcomes.

As always, we're keeping an eye on continuous improvement and our updated code of practice is now available. This covers some recently agreed best practice recommendations, such as including the building address within a fire action notice, to ensure any occupant can provide a location when contacting emergency services.

Finally, please don't forget to make a note of the key dates of meetings in your diaries and remember, we have access to the zoom video calling platforms, so they are accessible from around the country.

# FINANCE REPORT

For the year ended 30 June 2021

As indicated and expected, the past year has seen a substantial change in the annual figures as compared to previous years with the cancellation of the FireNZ conference in September 2020. The governance and management team have worked hard to mitigate the financial impact of the loss of the conference income by implementing cost reduction initiatives and stepping up activities in other areas to generate additional revenue.

In October 2020 we decided not to renew the lease agreement for the shared office area in Albany and have been working remotely in the meantime until conditions are more settled. This has been a successful transition and there has been no loss in productivity under the new arrangements while providing solid cost reduction to OPEX. It is anticipated that we will return to an office environment in due course when lease arrangements will be more favourable.

We are pleased to report that once again we have had no debt to write off, and our collection rate continues to be managed to ensure that this continues. The financial accounts show several notable differences to last year's figures, however. The decision to cancel the FireNZ 2021 conference was only taken in September this year, meaning that there was a large amount of FireNZ revenue invoiced and received as of 30 June 2021, affecting the bank accounts, Accounts Receivable and the Income in Advance figures. In contrast to this, the 2020 accounts did not include any FireNZ revenue as the conference was cancelled earlier in the year and no invoices were raised in that period. This revenue has all subsequently been refunded meaning the net impact is zero.

The external audit of our Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2021 was completed by Crowe, this being the fifth year that they have been engaged. We are pleased to report that the Auditor's Report was once again extremely positive, with no adjustments to provided figures, and the process was uneventful.

We still produced a surplus for the year of \$53,530. This was 39% down on the surplus of \$135,019 for the year ended 30 June 2020, attributable almost entirely to the cancellation of the conference. However, this was substantially higher than the forecast result for the year, largely due to the aforementioned cost savings and various successful training events and increase in our other revenue streams.

The financial position of the Association continues to strengthen. The Working Capital (ie Current Assets less Current Liabilities) increased from \$584,289 in 2020 to \$638,233 in 2021. Accumulated funds have increased also from \$599,973 to \$653,503, meaning that the association is still in an extremely favourable financial position. We also continue to manage appropriate types of investment of these funds to maximise return until the funds are needed in the future.

FPANZ is a not-for-profit incorporated society that is governed by a constitution and Board of Directors with its national head office based in Auckland. The operating structure of FPANZ has a constitution as the framework and is based on three tiers of governance.

#### 1. Basis of Preparation

FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION (NEW ZEALAND) INCORPORATED has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

#### Basis of Measurement

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis except certain items for which specific accounting policies are identified.

#### Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$).

#### 2. Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

##### (a) Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the entity and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received, excluding GST, rebates, and any trade discounts.

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in profit or loss in proportion to the delivery of the service at the reporting date. Under this method, revenue is recognised in the accounting periods in which the services are provided.

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis.

##### (b) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable which are stated inclusive of GST.

##### (c) Income Tax

FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION (NEW ZEALAND) INCORPORATED is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

##### (d) Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

##### (e) Receivables

Receivables are stated at expected realisable value. Bad debts are written off during the period in which they are identified.

##### (f) Liabilities

Liabilities are stated at the estimated amounts payable and include all obligations that can be reliably estimated. Current liabilities include the amount payable within twelve months of these financial statements.

#### 3. Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the financial year (2020 - nil).

# Membership 2021-2022



## PROVISIONAL MEMBERSHIP

All companies, organisations and individuals wishing to become a member of FPANZ are required to join as a provisional member for a minimum of 12 months. This provisional period is required to be completed before being considered for the appropriate membership tier level based on staff numbers and services that are provided.

### Requirements for provisional application:

- › A provisional membership fee (equal to the applicable membership tier's annual fee) will be payable on acceptance of provisional membership application
- › A Code of Ethical Conduct Declaration
- › A letter/certificate of confirmation from your insurers to state that the company has an appropriate level of Professional Indemnity insurance for their needs and a minimum Public Liability of \$2 million
- › An introductory interview meeting via phone or Zoom with CEO and at least one Board member.
- › A completed declaration of endorsement by three current FPANZ members who have been full members of FPANZ for a minimum of 2 consecutive full financial years.
- › A completed form from two referees who are clients of the applicant

### Provisional conditions – All applications to go through a 12-month provisional period

- › Provisional period to last for 12 months from date of application and may be extended at the discretion of the Board
- › Provisional Members are not eligible to vote or hold office
- › A follow up interview meeting via phone or Zoom with CEO and at least one board member at the end of the provisional period
- › Full membership can be refused at the discretion of the Board at the conclusion of the provisional period

## COMPANY MEMBERSHIP TIER

For businesses providing fire protection services and/or products to the New Zealand market, and who wish to take a more active role within FPANZ. There are four levels of Company Membership based on employee numbers. These are Gold, Silver and Bronze, and Platinum by special application to the FPANZ Board.
