HOFFE SIG Update

We hope everyone had a good Easter break and a chance to recharge the batteries. The HOFFE SIG group have had a very busy start to the year as we look to progress the key goals for the group. Below is an update of the progress by the group:

- › **NZS4503** – Scott has confirmed we are waiting for NZ Standards to provide the estimate for the changes to NZS 4503:2005 that we have put forward as a group, from there we can review the funding model we have available and start the review process.
- › **Fluorine Free Foam** – We have now completed the FPANZ Guidance Note to clarify the Fire Fighting Chemicals Groups expectations and our responsibilities under their 2021 Standard 1-HSR002573. This document is available on the FPANZ website and we encourage people to use it to educate your customers.
- › **Lithium-Ion- fire extinguisher** claims and events continue to be a source of concern. We will have an update on the progress of the TAN09 Portable Fire Extinguishers Lithium Batteries which is currently in review with FPA Australia.
- › **Non-compliant Fire Extinguisher product in the retail sector** has been an issue for a number of years. We are starting to progress discussions with various groups to ensure they understand what is required to legally import and distribute this product. This will be a long process but as an association we need to educate this sector so that the product is not devalued.

We welcome those with an interest in the topics above or any HOFFE related topics to join us at our next HOFFE group meeting which is on Friday the 19th May from 1pm.

Inspectorate SIG Update

Design Parameter Reviews

Related to the role of an Inspectorate, we have noted several issues which can cause problems in the timely certification of sprinkler systems.

On occasion, we are seeing Design Parameter Submissions well into the construction phase of a project, with significant errors which make certification problematic, or even impossible. NZS4541 requires that a submission is made prior to work commencing on site. While some may see the submission as a box-ticking exercise, the process is designed to reduce the risk of non-compliance of sprinkler systems. This risk reduction extends further than just the fire sprinkler contractor as its benefits other stakeholders such as the head contractor, the building owner, and the occupant.

When the review is carried out, it is unusual for an entirely clean review letter to be issued. Often the questions we ask are issues of formality. Sometimes our questions are based on concerns that we have as to the appropriateness of the design. On occasion, we have had response to our questions provided at the end of the project, when it can be problematic if the responses are not as expected.

We stress the need to ensure that Design Parameter Submissions are timely, and that our responses are carefully reviewed, to ensure that the project can run to time.

Seismic Bracing and Gravity Hangers

Contractors are reminded that there has been a significant ground movement in NZS4541:2020 with respect to seismic bracing and gravity hangers. The days of using 10mm threaded rod at 450 as the be all and end all for seismic bracing have gone.

Seismic bracing needs to be designed, including the correct selection of components. Inspectors need to inspect against the designs. We are still seeing “old-school” bracing being installed at the discretion of fitters, using unrated components. An additional problem arises when supervisors or fitters select different products to what is shown on the drawings without seeking comment from the designer to confirm suitability.

The maximum allowable spacing of gravity hangers has also changed. The de facto spacings in NZS4541:2020 has reduced from those in previous issues of the standard. However, larger spacings may be employed if proven by simple engineering calculations.

Evacuation Consultants SIG Update

This month there has been some excellent discussion around equitable egress hosted at the Beca Auditorium in Auckland. Between the panel of guest speakers, some good organisation and audience participation I expect there will be many more discussions to come. We would love to hear from people not directly related to the fire industry about some of the challenges they face, and some of the important points to consider both within design and daily operations.

Now that we have moved to daylight saving, it is important to remember that evening fire drills may now be run at dusk or when it is dark, changing the risks associated with running the drills. It also provides an opportunity to assess suitability of lighting etc. where evacuations may occur in the dark.

In May we see the Code of Practice for interface testing seminars taking place, fire drills create the ideal opportunity for full interface testing as the occupants within the building are already disrupted by the alarms sounding, it also means they get to experience any ancillary devices such as fire curtains in operation.

Passive Fire Protection SIG Update

Passive Fire during Construction phase & alterations:

Sadly, in April I read of the tragic hospital fire in Beijing where at least 29 people lost their lives. Despite stark differences in building codes and standards between New Zealand and China I think there are important details from these global tragedies that we should take a moment to reflect and see if we are doing enough or if we too are at risk. Obviously SkyCity Fire in Auckland is still front of mind and an example of how things can turn terrible in a very quick and disastrous way.

Early investigations suggest that the cause of the fire was related to construction activity within the existing hospital building. Any construction activity within an existing building poses a huge additional risk to the building occupants. The same level of risks should also be considered for new builds or unoccupied building sites as the risks are significantly different from a complete building that is functioning with all of its life safety systems in place. Evacuation of tradesmen is considerably simpler than evacuation of public and building occupants, however this doesn't reduce the fact that there is still a risk to human life and property.

Some increased risks from construction activity include:

- » **Isolated active systems** – Sprinklers and alarms either fully decommissioned or isolated to certain areas (or in new builds they simply aren't commissioned yet).
- » **Remove in part of full Fire & Smoke separations** – removal of fire doors, opening fire walls for new services, openings in floors, alterations to fire/ smoke separations (or simply not constructed yet).
- » **Reduced egress paths** – often stairwells will be taken out of action, and building evacuation can be funnelled .
- » **Impeded egress paths** – hoardings, building materials and the like will often impact on egress paths.
- » **Access for Fire & Emergency appliances** – road and parking access around construction sites is often limited with service trench openings at street, trades vehicles, hoardings, poor quality mud site access, heavy traffic for deliveries and the like.
- » **Poor lighting** – construction sites mostly have poor lighting as trades are reliant on task lighting only. Combined with this is the frequent use of temporary Exit signage that is often not powered or even glo sign, or sufficient lux for proper use.
- » **Increased activities causing fire/ sparks** – welding, grinding, roof membrane application, power tools, lithium iron batteries – are some of the highest risk activities for causing fires on building sites.
- » **Increased volume of highly flammable products & waste** – generally building sites are scattered with cardboard, paper, and building materials, or even chemicals that are considerably more flammable than what would be found in a completed building.
- » **Change in circumstance not notified to FENZ** – It is likely that FENZ are arriving to a building expecting it to be as a usual building, only to find out on arrival that it is a construction site.
- » **Lack of inspection for BWOFF purposes** due to constant changing built environment, out of date Compliance schedules pending completion of works.

On the contrary the common mitigation systems in New Zealand are:

- » **Certificate of Public Use (CPU)** – in my opinion these should be enforced more at the front end of alteration projects (as opposed to a temporary fix until Code Compliance is ►

resolved). CPU applications and approvals should consider all of the above. Are CPU's being enforced? Are they detailed enough? Are they checked up or followed up on?

- › **Contractors H&S Site Management** – whilst these often present nicely on the surface they are often lacking in any detail on Fire safety or evacuation. I summarise these documents and management as tick-box exercises, as opposed to real depth Risk analysis and management. Of the 100 building sites I've walked through in the past 12 months, I have only really been impressed by one site that had suitable Fire safety & evacuation in place.
- › **Hot works permits** – again these are generally a tick-box exercise, if in place at all.
- › **Fire reports** – occasionally I see Fire reports that have designed and considered temporary Fire separations. However, not frequently.
- › **Insurance notification** – Sprinkler shutdowns are notified to Insurers.

Effectively we leave the risk management to the main contractor, and use H&S Act as the only real tool to enforce. Main Contractors aren't trained sufficiently to fully understand the risks their building sites pose to their trades or the existing building occupants. **From a Fire Safety industry I feel there is a gap here.**

From a Passive Fire Sector there are few considerations that I think could be considered on your next build project, including:

1. **Hot works – include Fire rated linings as protection in areas** – such as a fire rated board over existing non fire rated materials. Or a designated Hot works area with adequate protection in place.
2. **Consideration for storage of Lithium iron batteries** – particularly over night when no one on site.
3. **Construction of temporary fire separations** during staged works.
4. **Prioritise Safe paths in construction sequencing** – i.e complete stairs early rather than later so that they can be used as per their design intent.
5. **Temporary Fire stopping closure to risers, service runs and the like** – i.e don't leave openings in fire separations for excessive periods.
6. **Notify FENZ of temporary weaknesses in Fire & Smoke separations.**
7. **External scaffold stair access that is suitably large for Emergency evacuation/ access** – to avoid impacting on the existing egress paths.
8. **Milestones to consider completion of Fire separations** – i.e notify client, council, FENZ when a significant zone has been commissioned for active and passive fire systems.
9. **Waste management & housekeeping** – get the flammable products away from construction activity and offsite sooner.

To name only a few.
