### Annual General Meeting (AGM)-Related Business

### Audit Update

The association's accounts undergo a full independent external audit each year. # Evacuation Consultants SIG Update

Many of us are continuing to understand the latest release of the FENZ online system for evacuation schemes, they are continuing to work in the background making improvements to the system. One of the noticeable impacts of the system, has been the delay with processing evaluation scheme applications, the Regulatory Compliance Group (RCG) that manage this are currently running at about eight weeks processing time. They are acutely aware of the impact this is having and continue to ask for your patience whilst they work through this. Please feel free to contact them directly at [rcg@fireandemergency.nz](mailto:rcg@fireandemergency.nz) with any concerns about applications, and suggested recommendations with the new system.

The new system allows for evacuation drill and training reports to be updated immediately onto the FENZ system, which means there is no delay in their records being updated and subsequently allows them to have accurate information to hand. This can reduce unnecessary letters and communications being sent out to building owners telling them their drills are overdue.

As usual you are welcome to attend our special interest group meetings, where these matters are often discussed. All of the meetings can be found on the FPA calendar via the website.

# HOFFE SIG Update

Hi all. October is pretty much gone but it has been an eventful month, sporting-wise, election-wise and in our industry's case, we also held the FIRENZ conference, this time in downtown Auckland.

One of the “hot topics” of conversation that we are hearing from members increasingly is that of products being sold based on claims that cannot be substantiated under the AS/NZS framework. The obvious and arguably most prominent one is for water type fire extinguishers which are approved under AS/NZS 1841.2 for use on class A fires but are also claimed to work on lithium-Ion fires. While there is no problem with a water type fire extinguisher, with or without an additive, being manufactured to meet the requirements of AS/NZS 1841.2 and given a rating after having being tested to AS/NZS 1850, the problem can be with the way performance and approval claims may be made.

As things currently stand the combined AS/NZS standards 1841 parts 1 – 8 and 1850 have never incorporated manufacturing or testing for fire extinguishers which are intended to be used on fires involving Lithium-Ion. This means if anyone claims to have a fire extinguisher that is tested and/or approved under/by the AS/NZS standards for use on Lithium-Ion fires they are making a false claim.

Another topic that has been brought to our attention is that of product clearance – this is a mandatory Worksafe requirement for fire extinguishers to be inspected and the shipment to be certified by an Authorised Compliance Certifier under the Health & Safety at Work (Hazardous Substances) Regulations- 2017. As with most things in life, getting product clearance comes at a cost which the importing company pays prior to the cylinder being able to be sold on to the N.Z. market.

# Passive Fire Protection SIG Update

It was great to catch up with so many familiar, and new faces at FIRENZ a few weeks ago. It was also great to be able to briefly introduce Loren Olsen to everyone as the newly appointed Passive Fire Technical and Training Manager for FPANZ. Loren has great credibility across the country within our industry and is going to be a great asset to FPANZ and the industry as we continue to strive to better the industry and the people that operate in it. Welcome Loren, we are looking forward to working closely with you on upskilling the industry and having dedicated resource to tackle the challenges and opportunities in front of us.

Onto Technical points: I've been coin tossing about which one of my pet peeves I'd like to tackle this month, and Fire rated HVAC duct encasement has come out on top.

In my opinion, this is the single biggest shortcoming in New Zealand's Construction And Passive Fire Sector. Unfortunately, it is very poorly understood, specified, constructed or inspected in NZ. This is likely largely to the fact that it is left to non-Passive Fire Specialist such as HVAC trade or lagging installers.

The reason I find it so alarming that this element of Passive Fire is so poorly managed in NZ is that it also coincides with likely one of the biggest fire risks within commercial buildings with restaurants or cooking. *High risk of fire, plus poor passive fire management is a disaster waiting to happen.* I'm surprised this hasn't appeared on the hit list radar for FENZ, BCAs, Engineers or Insurance providers for some time.

There will be countless numbers of non-compliant, or no protection at all, to various extract systems in takeaway shops beneath flats, commercial restaurants, hotel restaurants, hospitals, cafés and the like, throughout the country.

I believe part of the problem why this is the status in New Zealand, is that this aspect often falls in no-man's-land. Somewhere between:

- » HVAC Engineer vs Fire Engineer
- » HVAC Contractor vs Passive Specialist
- » SS9 IQP vs SS15.3 IQP
- » Base build design/ construction vs Tenant fitout

As well as

- » Reliance on Producer Statements – if a BCA or Engineer is reliant on a generic coverage PS3 then it is possible these works were never inspected or completed as per test requirements.
- » Generic specifications or simply 'call out Fire rated wrap' without specific detailing and understanding of manufacturers installation details.

## Some quick facts on Fire encasement to HVAC ducts.

1. Any time there is a commercial cooking extract range hood, the duct must be fire rated from the start of its firecell to termination. This often means fire encasing all the way up to a roof.
  - a. Dampers can not be used in these ducts due to fat and grease buildup .
2. Any time the fire protected duct passes through a new fire separation, there must be a specific fire stopping tested detail.
3. Any time there is an access hatch required in the fire protected duct, there must be a specific fire tested detail as well.
4. Each system will have limitations on its use for duct size, etc. ►

## PASSIVE SIG Update *cont.*

5. Each system will have specific test limitations on hanging support minimums – i.e centres and size or hanger rods.
6. Each system will have specific installation detailing specific for the duct size.
7. Product options most common include:
  - a. Fire rated wrap
  - b. Fire rated Plasterboard
  - c. Fire rated Calcium Silicate board
  - d. Cementitious spray
  - e. Duct lining board itself
  - f. Alternative solution with sprinkler system

Some of the most common failings I see and hear about in NZ are most frequently to do with fire wrap and include:

- 】 Running wrap length ways of duct – not wrapped around the duct as per tested detail;
- 】 Not overlapping the wrap as it goes along the duct;
- 】 Wrong installation fixings for the size of duct i.e 800 x 800 duct using a 150 dia duct installation detail:
  - No strap bracing around the duct which will be determined by the manufacturers' tested detail
  - No pin anchors;
- 】 Penetrations of duct not treated through fire walls/ floors as per manufacturers' tested detail;
- 】 Hatches not installed as per manufacturers' tested detail;
- 】 Minimum hanger support numbers and sizes not being followed as per manufacturers' tested detail;
- 】 60-minute specification being used where ducts pass through 90, 120 and 180 minute fire cells;
- 】 Fire wrap being specified for external environments that it is not suitable for;
- 】 Fire wrap not being installed in suitable timeframe for construction and therefore becomes near impossible to install compliant;
- 】 Being missed from Compliance Schedule;
- 】 Being missed from Consent Documents.

Keep an eye out on your next project where commercial cooking extracts are involved.

# Contractors SIG Update

## **Construction Contracts (Retention Money) Amendment Act 2023**

Earlier this month the [Construction Contracts \(Retention Money\) Amendment Act 2023](#) came into force, after being provided royal assent on 5th April 2023.

These amendments ensure a fair and transparent process for all parties and apply to all commercial construction contracts that are entered into or renewed after the 5th October 2023. The amendments strengthen the CCA's retentions regime for the benefit of the subcontractors should the head contractor become insolvent. Significantly, the changes collectively ensure that subcontractors money does not become entangled with head contractors cashflow as working capital.

A summary of the key changes;

1. Retention money is automatically held on trust. The trust is created when an amount becomes "*retention money*" under section 18B.
2. When asked (and at least every 3 months) the holder of the retention must provide certain information to the party that has retentions being held on them. This record must identify the bank account, construction contract(s), payments (in and out) amongst other things.
3. Each record on the statement must identify the parties involved and construction contract to which it relates.
4. Retention money **MUST** be deposited into a compliant NZ bank account (interest earned is automatically assigned to the holder of the retention unless specified elsewhere in the contract). The holder of the retentions must notify the bank that the account is to hold retention money on trust under the CCA.
5. Failure to comply with the CCA amendments is a criminal offence.

Contractors and subcontractors should ensure they understand their rights in relation to retentions held for their benefit. If you have not already done so, you should write to holders of YOUR retentions and ask for evidence of where they are held.

The intent of this Code of Practice is to provide guidance for the design, commissioning and routine testing of integrated fire safety systems. This is to be achieved by ensuring that the active interconnections/interface between the various systems in a building are tested as a whole, not just independently of each other.

We’ve had lots of positive feedback, thank you. We have also received some suggestions for improvement. We are in the process of reviewing the document and invite further comments for consideration and incorporation into the next revision.

Devin Glennie (Principal Advisor Building Code) will host a discussion on the new acceptable solutions and verifications methods and what this means for you. Devin will be joined by other members of the Building Performance and Engineering team:

- **Saskia Holditch** and **Tania Morgun** (Senior Fire Engineers) will be speaking to the changes to C/AS1, C/AS2 and the updates to the Standards relating to fire alarms, sprinkler systems and domestic smoke alarms.
- **Ross Wakefield** (Building Performance Senior Advisor) will be speaking on improvements to the acceptable solutions and verification methods for E1 Surface Water, G12 Water Supplies and G13 Foul Water which support plumbing and drainage work. This includes limits to lead in plumbing products, reduced water temperatures at the tap to prevent scalding and backflow prevention.

# Upcoming 2023 Changes to Building Code Fire Protection Documents

MBIE Building Performance has recently published the results of their 2022 consultation on:

- › protection from fire for residential homes (C/AS1), and
- › fire safety system standards (C/AS2, C/VM2, and F7/AS1)

This gives a clear statement of the changes that will be implemented in November 2023, with a 12 month transition period.

In summary, there was overwhelming support for the following changes to be implemented:

- › To require interconnected smoke alarms as the minimum fire safety system throughout household units – this includes both hard-wired and 10-year battery wireless options
- › Citing the new AS 1668.1: 2015 *The use of ventilation and air conditioning in buildings – Fire and smoke control in buildings* Amendment 1, with modifications to invoke NZS 4512 panel, detector, and detector spacing requirements
- › Citing AS/NZS 3000: 2018 Electrical installations – Known as the *Australian/New Zealand Wiring Rules*
- › Citing NZS 4512: 2021 *Fire detection and alarm systems in buildings*
- › Citing NZS 4514: 2021 *Interconnected smoke alarms for houses*
- › Citing NZS 4541: 2020 *Automatic fire sprinkler systems*
- › Removing requirements for a landline phone if a connection to a remote receiving centre can be omitted
- › Removing restrictions for sprinklers so that when Type 4 smoke detection can be substituted by Type 3 heat detection, the use of sprinklers is not more restricted than the use of heat detectors
- › Requiring sprinkler systems to extend throughout any car park areas in the building
- › Editorial changes and corrections, including the consolidation into C2/AS2 of requirements currently spread between F7/AS1 and C2/AS2.

Other proposed changes to the requirements for residential homes (Fire Resistance Ratings, structural adequacy of loadbearing elements, fire separations, external fire spread) in C/AS1 did not receive wide support, and some significant technical and complexity issues were raised. These have been held over, and will become the subject of future consultation(s).

It should be noted that these changes **do not** include any specification of buildings (or parts of buildings) where Visual Alerting Devices (VADs) might be required to meet the needs of the deaf and hard of hearing. MBIE has started a work programme to review the broader subject of accessibility in buildings, including VADs. It is to be hoped that this will progress to a conclusion in a timely manner.

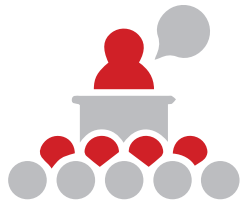

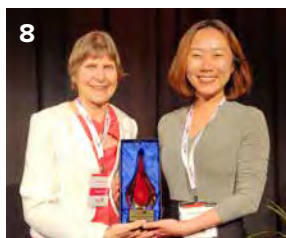

# Building (Building Product Information) Regulations 2022

Organisations supply equipment into the fire protection industry will need to be cognisant of the requirements of the above referenced regulations. We have an informal opinion that this will apply to equipment used in fire protection systems, such as sprinklers, valves, fire alarm panels and smoke detectors. These regulations come into force on 11 December 2023.
