Annual Elections

As per our current constitution and rules, the tenure of board, council and SIG roles are all mandated for a set period of time. This is to ensure people in the roles are cycled through but have long enough to carry out some objectives. This year we had a relatively light number coming up for rotation, so the process has been a bit easier. The following positions were up for rotation:

- Two elected council positions

We had one nomination for the President position. This was Justin McEntyre, who is a current director of the Association. As Justin was not contested, no vote was required. Justin will take over the position in January 2024.

On the council, both David Prosser and Bryce Donaldson were required to step down or seek re-election. Both felt they had more to give and were prepared to seek re-election. As we have received only their two nominations, no vote is required under the rules of the constitution.

The two SIG Chair roles have not been completed at time of writing this as nominations and voting are separate to the constitution requirements. I will update on the outcomes in December.

There are several other requirements that we must go through due to the timing of our AGM. The primary contacts of each member company have been party to these requirements for compliance with the Charities Act.

Rotorua Lakes Council issues Spa Lodge dangerous building notices, residents moved out after fire

Twenty people have been moved out of a Rotorua lodge issued two dangerous building notices in a week – the first for dead-bolting residents in at night.

The second notice was issued to Spa Lodge after a fire on its deck last week. The fire happened while Rotorua Lakes Council was awaiting a fire safety assessment that later found the building had an "extremely high fire risk".

The lodge on Amohau St in the CBD had moved from hosting tourists to providing emergency housing in recent years and lately had been taking long-term tenants.

Council community and district development group manager Jean-Paul Gaston said a person contacted the council about the "sanitary conditions" at Spa Lodge on November 6.

Staff contacted the lodge and were invited to inspect it on November 16.

"During the inspection staff had concerns for the occupants' safety, given that the exit doors were being dead-bolted at night, locking occupants inside the building," Gaston said.

The council issued a dangerous building notice that day and the operator was given time to rectify the issues. The council also requested advice from Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ).

Before the report landed, firefighters were called to Spa Lodge on November 20. A Fenz spokesperson said crews were called to a fire on the deck of a property in Rotorua at 9.53am. The fire was extinguished and the matter was referred to police.

Gaston said the council was told about the fire that day and given further advice. It received the FENZ report on November 22 and issued the second dangerous building notice ordering the occupants be removed "for their own safety".

Gaston said the lodge was being used for non-tourism accommodation that allowed long-term guests and is not an emergency housing provider.

'Extremely high fire risk'

The Fenz assessment, provided to *Local Democracy Reporting* by the council, concluded injury or death was considered "likely" in the event of a fire at the lodge.

"I [the report author] consider there is an extremely high fire risk to occupants in this building day or night, given the high risk/needs of the clientele, the inoperable handheld firefighting equipment, inadequate fire alarm system and the known behaviour of these occupants during a fire.

"I am concerned that a fire will grow out of control before anyone notices it, leaving occupants little time to escape."

The building also lacked an approved evacuation scheme and procedure, according to the report.

"The risk is heightened given the owner and management's apparent disregard for fire safety legislation."

Gaston said the council had a regulatory role in making sure buildings were safe and fit for purpose, and the Fenz assessment found the Spa Lodge was not, so the council acted to reduce the risk to the occupants "as quickly as possible".

He said the lodge owner, Ministry of Social Development and Rotorua housing hub Te Pokapū helped to

find alternative accommodation for the 20 people living at the lodge.

He said the building could not be occupied until its fire safety features provided a safe environment. The requirements had been discussed with the operator and other relevant agencies but the actions taken would depend on how the lodge would be used in future.

"Since the notice was issued the owner has been co-operative and is working with council to rectify the issues raised."

The notices were the only two issued by the council this year.

The notice, displayed on the outside of the building, said the owner must complete works to remove or reduce danger by February.

The Spa Lodge owner was approached for comment.

The council signed the Rotorua Housing Accord with the government and iwi last year aiming to address emergency housing issues in the city.

Under the accord, it had been looking at tenancies in backpackers and hostels.

Rotorua mayor Tania Tapsell said people's health and safety must come first.

Ministry of Social Development regional commissioner Jacob Davies said the ministry does not "place people in boarding houses or hostels".

Davies said it had no power to tell people where they should live, inspect their living arrangements, inspect buildings or monitor compliance with building regulations.

"Our staff provide people with advice about their options, and assess eligibility for financial assistance."

He said the ministry welcomed council action on unsafe buildings.

"We expect accommodation suppliers to meet the standards set by all the relevant regulatory authorities and for those authorities to take action where necessary."

The ministry paid accommodation supplements to over 350,000 households, about 29,000 of those in the Bay of Plenty.

What is a dangerous building notice?

Under the Building Act, a dangerous building is one that "in the ordinary course of events" – excluding earthquakes – is likely to cause injury or death to anyone in or on the property, or damage to other property.

A building can also be deemed dangerous if death or injury is likely in a fire to anyone in the building or on other property.

Likewise drills and training are still to be reported, this can be completed online and is updated immediately to their system.

Passive Fire Protection SIG Update

This will be my final newsletter as Passive SIG Chair, and I would like to thank everyone for the support and time over the past nearly 4 years.

On reflection of the past 3 - 4 years, I'm proud of what the Passive SIG has achieved and maintained, especially through what has been a turbulent time in history with the Pandemic and all the impacts that it's brought upon the world.

Highlight achievements of the SIG for me have included:

- 1. Release of Intumescent Coatings Code of Practice. Delivering this to the industry has had a hugely positive impact for the quality of Intumescent design and application throughout New Zealand.
- 2. Review and Revision 2 of Intumescent Coatings Code of Practice. This review and revision gave us the chance to tweak and better the document for all industry participants and aligns with the continual development and improvement we all want for the sector.
- 3. NZQA Level 3 Passive qualification. This course was only launched in late 2019 and a big focus has been on trying to get learner numbers and graduate numbers up across the country. Having the qualification was part one and the next stage has been a big grind for learners, employers and training organisations. Mixed in amongst this was the Government's merger of training organisations. I'm hugely proud that NZ now has over 200 qualified Level 3 installers in the field. There is more work to do, and I'm personally keen to see the numbers of yearly graduates continue to climb steadily. What FPANZ is investing and committing to in the training arena is exciting to see.
- **4. NZQA Level 4 Passive** this qualification has been a good starting point for inspectors and IQPs, however it was realised that there was a missing piece of qualification for Supervisors and the inspection aspects were outdated. The Passive SIG was instrumental and vocal in making sure this qualification received the update that the industry desired. So it is with pride that the Passive SIG alongside Hanga-Aro-Rau and Competenz has refreshed this qualification and after final review it will be fully available in mid 2024, with a clear pathway for anyone to start the new qualification today and not lose any time. It is exciting to see the growth of the training in our industry as many learners that have completed L3 will be moving straight into L4 to continue their career progression within the industry.
- **5. Passive Training Manager appointment Loren Olsen** the appointment of Loren is an exciting step and gives us the momentum to progress initiatives with Training and Technical information. Loren is a huge asset to the industry and a big win for FPANZ in executing its strategic plans.
- **6. Fire & Smoke Stopping Code of Practice** with a challenge laid down to have this document ready and released before FireNZ 2024, the new SIG has something motivating to sink its teeth into in the new year and with the level of prep work completed and current draft stage of this document, I'm excited to see it's release.
- 7. Certified Contractors competency is the single biggest risk to our sector that needs attention. The Certified Contractor listing will be the final piece in the puzzle for FPANZ range of certifications and register listings. Establishing a quality threshold for contractors/specifiers and third-party personnel operating within the passive sector will certainly raise the bar and allow clients, engineers and councils a benchmark for

selection and trust. The higher we raise the bar the more trust we have with everyone in the industry and can clearly identify the quality operators.

- **8. Products Register filterable version** the Passive Products Register is now well ingrained in the NZ construction sector, and is regularly referenced and sighted. This register has played a major part in lifting the covers on free and open transparency of fire test reports and removed previous lack of trust and untruths. The development of the filterable version has focused on end user experience and made access, information and specification for architects, councils and the like much easier. A single search point for options available and comparison is a gem of a tool. A microscope is being shone over this register with expert analysis and integrity, and this increases the trust we can have in the listings.
- **9. Training & Development** we increased our outreach to other related sectors and industries through webinars, Get it Right Seminars, articles and have much more planned for 2024.

There is much to continue with, and I look forward maintaining an interest and seeing the Passive SIG carry the industry forward in a positive direction. Competency and Training/ Education are critical aspects to keep moving forward with in my opinion and an area that I believe FPANZ can continue to provide huge benefits to New Zealand. Change in our industry isn't overnight, but it does happen.

It has been a privilege and learning experience for me sitting as the Passive SIG Chair. It is a role that isn't possible without contribution from many people in the industry and when rowing together in the same direction, great things do happen.

Recording and Reporting on the amount of Diesel Fuel Consumed:

Climate Change factors are quite rightly gaining more focus in everything that we do, be it at home or in the workplace. Over the years New Zealand has made several international commitments such as the Kyoto, Montreal, and Paris protocols. In recent times there has been a focus on Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions. As a result of such initiatives, some members will have already experienced customers seeking data on the quantity of diesel fuel that we typically consume during the testing of diesel fire pumps on an annual basis. Some organisations are forced to provide GHG emissions reporting statements such as a Carbon Related Disclosure Statement or as part of the Carbon Neutral Government Program Reporting. In addition to this there are organisations that just want to do the right thing and be good corporate citizens and report their GHG emissions on a voluntary basis. To assist with this task the Ministry for the Environment has published a document titled "Measuring Emissions: A guideline for Organisations". This contains practical steps as to how to estimate and report GHG emissions.

As an example, if we consider that a medium sized diesel driven fire pump (i.e., 100kW power draw at the pump) is run every week for a period of 15 minutes and has a further 2 hours run as part of its annual requirement this equates to approximately 390 litres of diesel used annually. This estimate has been based on the assumption, that the pump test return has been sized correctly, if this is not the case the fuel used per year may be higher. This quantity of fuel, in turn produces the following estimated quantity of emissions based on the emission factors published in the above-mentioned document and the assumption that in this example a fire pump is deemed to be used for commercial use as opposed to industrial use.

- CO_2 emissions = 390L x 2.67 = 1,041.30 kg CO_2
- Arr CH₄ emissions = 390L x 0.0102 = 3.978 kg CO_{2-e}
- N_2O emissions = 390L x 0.00581 = 2.266 kg CO_{2-e}
- **Total CO**₂ emissions = 390L x 2.69 = 1049.1 kg CO_{2-e}

(Note- as per the note in the Ministry's publication, derived quantities may not add up due to rounding)

The Fire Protection Association supports environmental initiatives and would therefore encourage all of it members to actively assist and cooperate with their customers with the collection and reporting of such valuable data. Ideally this data collection could be undertaken electronically i.e., to show that as an industry, we are also serious about reducing our carbon footprint and emissions. This could be as simple to achieve as keeping an electronic record of billing quantities i.e., how much diesel fuel was purchased for that customer within a given year. Alternatively, a "Diesel Fire Pump Fuel Consumption Record Sheet" could be established on site to record the likes of, how much fuel was added on a given date and the total annual quantity used in a given calendar year.

For those members that want to undertake further reading on emissions reporting for NZ organisations, the Ministry for the Environment has published the "Measuring Emissions: A guideline for Organisations".

<u>2023/024:</u> Regarding the authority's proposed decision to refuse to issue a building consent in respect of the location of a pool barrier.

<u>2023/025</u>: The authority's decision to issue a notice to fix for a container arch structure that was constructed without building consent.

2023/026: Regarding the compliance of a pool barrier with section 162C of the Building Act 2004.

<u>2023/027:</u> The compliance with clause E2 of a proposed direct-fixed plywood cladding system on a building.

2023/028: Regarding the compliance of a pool barrier with section 162C of the Building Act 2004.

<u>2023/029</u>: An authority's refusal of an application for a discretionary exemption from the requirement to obtain a building consent.

2023/030: The issue of a building consent, specifically in regard to three cladding details.

Updated documents have now been published as a result of the Building Code 2022 consultation.

New published documents

Plumbing and drainage

We have amended the acceptable solutions and verification methods to support plumbing and drainage work in Aotearoa New Zealand. This includes changes to Acceptable Solutions E1, G12 and G13.

· Protection from fire

We have amended Acceptable Solutions C/AS1, C/AS2, F7/AS1 and Verification Method C/VM2 to improve the safety of people from fire. This update includes the introduction of interconnected smoke alarms into residential units.

Structure

We have removed Clause 18.7.4.4 of NZS 3101.1:2006 from the citation in Verification Method B1/VM1. As part of this change, precast hollow-core floor assemblies can no longer be designed using this verification method. This change has no transition period and is effective from 2 November 2023.

Energy efficiency

The staged implementation process for window and door insulation requirements for new residential buildings has now ended. All areas of the country now have similar levels of window performance in H1/AS1 and H1/VM1.

These regulations come into force on 11 December 2023.
